Class 67 Recipe for Boiled Fruit Cake (Makes 2)

Ingredients:

1lb Self Raising Flour
14ozs Mixed Fruit or Sultanas
2ozs Cherries (Halved)
8ozs Margarine
8ozs Caster Sugar
2 Eggs
1/2 pt Milk
1 tbls Golden Syrup
1 tbls Black Treacle

Method:

Put flour and fruit in a large bowl. Put sugar, margarine, golden syrup and black treacle in a saucepan and melt slowly. Whisk eggs and milk together and mix well with melted ingredients. Add to flour and fruit and mix well. Pour into two greased, lined, approx 7 inch round cake tins. Cook at 300F/150C/ Gas Mark 2 for 1 hour 20 minutes. (fan assisted oven - 140C for 1 hour 10 minutes) Cool before turning out of tins.

Class 75 Recipe for Apple Cake

Ingredients:

9 oz Self Raising Flour
Pinch of Salt
6 oz Margarine
4 oz Caster Sugar
3 oz Sultanas
8 oz Apple (sliced thinly)
2 Eggs (beaten)

Method:

Heat Oven to 180C/ 350F/Gas Mark 4. Grease and line an 8" round tin. Put flour and salt into a bowl and rub in the margarine. Add the sugar, sultanas and sliced apple and stir in the beaten eggs. Mix well. Place into prepared tin and bake for about 50 minutes. Cover with foil for the first 30 minutes of the cooking time. When the cake has cooled, sprinkle a little caster sugar on top.

Class 80 Recipe for Banana Bread

Ingredients

1 3/4 oz Butter or Margarine

4 1/2 oz Sugar

2 Eggs

7 oz Self Raising Flour

Pinch of Salt

2 Ripe Bananas (Mashed)

Method:

Cream the fat and sugar. Beat in the eggs. Add dry ingredients and banana alternately. Beat until smooth. Bake in a greased and floured loaf tin 190C/375F/Gas Mark 5 for approximately 1 hour.

PRESERVES AND PRODUCE

Home-Made or Home-Produced

General Guidelines

Jars should be made of clear glass and free from all commercial/trade marks, whether on the lid, jar or base. If no seal of preservation is present, the item is not acceptable.

The containers should be clean, unblemished and filled to the rim.

Labels should be plain, neat and straight and of suitable size for the container. Place label between the seams of the jar. The label should state the contents and day, month and year of making.

Tiffin Cake

3oz (75g) Butter, 7oz (200g) Rich Tea Biscuits
2oz (50g) Chopped Cherries 2oz (50g) Chopped dried Apricots
4tbls Golden Syrup 4tbls Drinking Chocolate
4oz (100g) Milk Chocolate melted for the top

Method

Melt the butter, syrup and drinking chocolate over a gentle heat, in a pan, then remove and add crushed biscuits, cherries and apricots, mix together. Line a 1lb (450g) loaf tin with foil, press in mixture evenly, level top. Spread with melted chocolate on top. Chill for 1 hour, when set out into slices.

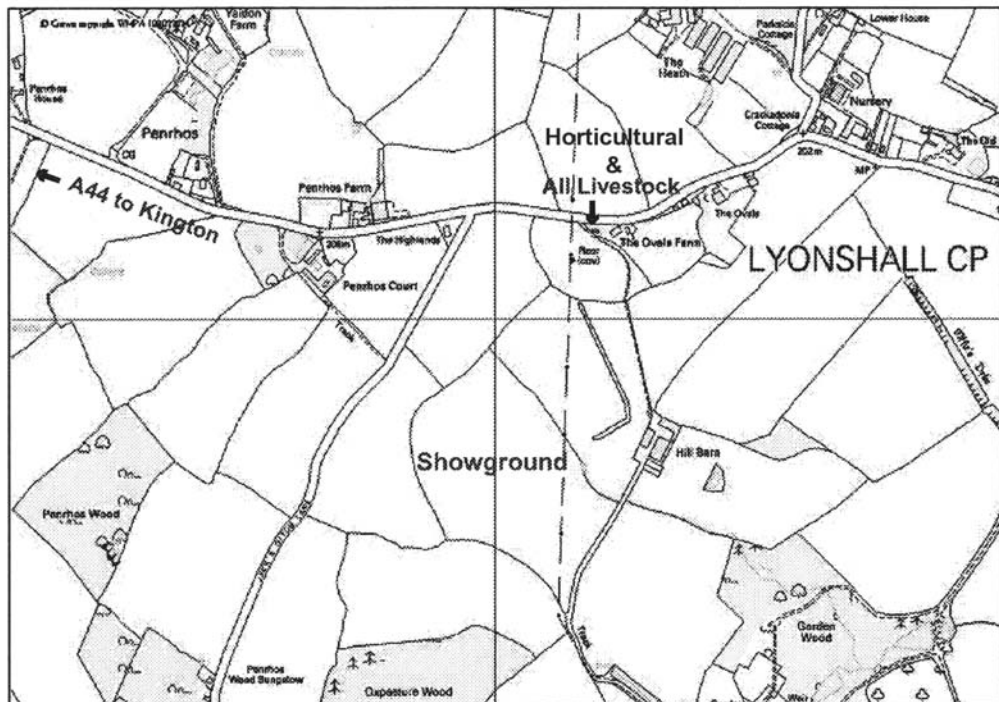

RULES

1. The Section shall be governed by a sub-committee elected by the members of the Society in General Meeting each year and in accordance with the main Rules of the Society.
The President, Chairman, Hon Treasurer and the Secretary, shall be ex-officio members of this sub-committee of which three members shall form a quorum.
2. Every exhibit must be the bona-fide property of and grown by the exhibitor, or made and produced by the exhibitor, with the exception of Classes 59 - 66 (inclusive). This rule will be strictly enforced and exhibitors infringing this rule will be disqualified, and all entry fees and prize money will be forfeited.
3. Specimens forming part of a collection may not be exhibited in any other class.
4. The prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the Committee in conjunction with the judges, and the right is reserved to alter or withdraw any prize if sufficient merit has not been shown, or if sufficient merit is not forthcoming or otherwise, at their absolute discretion.
5. No exhibitor shall be allowed to take more than one prize in any one class. Classes 1- 58 - only one prize will be awarded per household.
6. The Committee reserve the right to inspect any garden at any time and they also have the power to refuse any entry.
7. If there are fewer than five entries in any one class, the third prize may be withheld.
8. The decision of the Committee and judges shall be final as to merit. Any objection must be made in writing to the Secretary, by 2pm on the day of the Show, and must be accompanied by a deposit of £1 which will be refunded if the objection is sustained.
9. Specimens for exhibition must be staged before 10am prompt on the day of Show. Specimens sent after that time will be rejected. The tent will then be cleared for judging and re-open at 12.30pm approx. No exhibit may be removed until 5.30pm
10. Competitors must bring their own vases, plates etc, for staging of their exhibits. The sub-committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage but every care will be taken of all such equipment.
11. Trade Exhibits: Items may be sold from exhibits which form part of the display and collected after 5.30pm.
The committee are not responsible for any exhibit remaining after 6pm
12. All entries must be made on the Society's Form, and must be accompanied by a declaration signed by the Exhibitor in accordance with Rule 2. Entrance Fees must be paid at the time of entry.
No entry will be accepted after 4th September 2010.
Entries not recorded on the Judge's slip will be disqualified from the particular class.
13. Exhibitors making entries to the value of £5.00 and over will be issued with an exhibitor's free pass to the Show Ground, which is to be collected with staging numbers from the Horticultural Secretary on the morning of the Show.
14. Exhibitors may indicate that their exhibits are for sale, but the Committee cannot take part in any negotiations.
15. THE POINIS will be awarded as follows:-
Three for 1st; Two for 2nd; and One for 3rd where Trophies are applicable.
